# **CURRICULUM FOR EXCELLENCE UPDATE**

- Funding for local authorities for new Curriculum for Excellence resources was recently announced by the Scottish Government. Iain Ellis, Chair of the National Parent Forum, who is our representative on the Curriculum for Excellence Management Board, has asked for assurances that this funding reaches schools.
- The Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) is launching its new Results Services from 2014. The old appeals system, which allowed schools to submit pupils' work to the SQA to appeal exam results, has been replaced with an Exceptional Circumstances Consideration Service and a Post Results Service. For the latter, a clerical check or a re-mark can be requested by schools. Grades can go down as well as up for re-marked papers.
- The SQA <u>exam timetable</u> is now available for those sitting examinations for the new National 5s, for Highers and for Advanced Highers.
- **Decisions about prelims and exam leave** have always been taken locally by schools, in consultation with staff and parents. Please share your views on these with your parent council.
- The SQA's leaflet on National Literacy Units sets out information on new SQA requirements for the assessment of these units.
   Scribes cannot be used for writing assessments; readers cannot be used for reading assessments.
- CALL (Communication, Access, Literacy and Learning Scotland)
  has produced <u>guidance</u> on how digital equipment can support pupils'
  literacy assessments, replacing the need for human scribes and
  readers.

- ICT SURVEY Please complete our survey on ICT provision in your school! Earlier this year, we launched a campaign to look at the roll out of Wi Fi in schools, by writing to the Directors of Education in all of Scotland's 32 local authorities to ask about provision. Continuing our campaign, we are now seeking your input. Please complete our Survey Monkey questionnaire about Wi Fi and ICT in your school you may need to enlist your children's help!
- Nationals in a Nutshell Our very well-received summary guides for parents on the new National qualifications are now available for all subjects at National 4 and National 5 and available as summaries of National 1s, National 2s and National 3s.
- A National Parent Forum representative has been invited to join the Scottish Government's Programme Board for 'Getting it Right for Every Child', following a presentation to the Board by three of our representatives.
- A new Consultative Group on assessment, tracking and reporting, made up of parents, teachers, local authorities, Education Scotland and Scottish Government, has been established by the National Parent Forum. The group aims to explore current assessment and 'reporting to parents' arrangements in schools, how these arrangements are communicated to parents and whether parents are receiving the right type of information to help them understand how their child is progressing. This in turn allows parents to support the work of teachers in helping young people to achieve their best. The group will run from now until June. Views of parents, teachers and children will be sought and considered as the group progresses. For further information, email our East Renfrewshire representative, Joseph McLachlan.
- Two parent focus groups on the proposed Code of Conduct for the Additional Support for Learning Act were organised by the National Parent Forum in September and October. Vice chair and Glasgow rep, Joanna Murphy, presented our report from the focus groups to the Scottish Government's Advisory Group for Additional Support for Learning group. The focus group reports are available here.
- The Scottish Government's Instrumental Music Implementation Group is to take forward the recommendations of the Instrumental Music Group which was attended by our National Parent Forum rep, Douglas Chapelle. Douglas will again represent us on this new body; email him with your comments and queries.

# **Internet Safety**

At our conference, Minister for Children and Young People, Aileen Campbell, announced her intention to hold a summit on internet safety. The summit, jointly hosted by Aileen Campbell and Dr Alasdair Allan, Minister for Learning, is to be held in Edinburgh on 4 December. It will bring key partners, including Iain Ellis, Chair of the National Parent Forum, together to consider how best children can be protected online and how to inform parents about safety measures that can be taken.

# CHILDREN WHO ARE TOO ILL TO ATTEND SCHOOL

The National Parent Forum supported parent participation in the Scottish Government's consultation on proposed changes to legislation on school closures. A consultation report from the Scottish Government will be published in due course on the Scottish Government website.

The 'Amazing Things' publication sets out the many recognised awards available to young people aged 12 to 25 which reflect and recognise wider achievement beyond formal learning. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award, the John Muir Award scheme, Dynamic Youth Awards, Leadership, Employability and Personal Development Awards are just a few of the options available.
