# CURRICULUM FOR EXCELLENCE BROAD GENERAL EDUCATION (EARLY YEARS-S3):

### \*NATIONAL PARENT FORUM ATTAINMENT WORKING GROUP

Do you know how your child's learning is progressing? Our National Parent Forum group, comprising parents, teachers and representatives of Education Scotland, has been looking at how children's progress and attainment is tracked in the Broad General Education and how it is reported to parents. Our East Renfrewshire rep, Joseph McLachlan, who has led the group, commented: "This has been a big piece of work, involving time and commitment from this collaborative group. I am really pleased with how we worked together, to seek out examples of good practice in how our children's progress is tracked and how parents are kept informed. We will publish our report with recommendations shortly on the NPFS website."

### \*MODERN LANGUAGES: 1+2 POLICY

Our recent parent focus group which was held in East Lothian asked parents about their understanding of the 1 + 2 Modern Languages policy and about their local experience of the roll-out of this policy, which requires all children and young people in the Broad General Education to have the opportunities to learn two modern languages in addition to their first language. Initial findings suggest that local authorities are making preparations for this but that information about this has not yet been widely shared with parents. Our report and recommendations will appear on our website soon.

# CURRICULUM FOR EXCELLENCE SENIOR PHASE (\$4-\$6/COLLEGE):

### \*NEW CFE QUALIFICATIONS RESOURCES FOR PARENTS AND LEARNERS

We continue to add to our well-received information resources which explain the new CfE National Qualifications. These can all be found on our website. Nationals and Highers in a Nutshell are our series of CfE National Qualifications subject course summaries. There are Nutshell summaries available in 30 subjects at National 4 and 5 and 30 at CfE Higher. Progression in a Nutshell sets out how qualifications link together from S4 into college/university or work-based learning so you can see the range of learning and qualification pathways that are available to young people. Skills in a Nutshell maps out the wide range of CfE skills - personal skills, key skills, thinking skills and specialist skills - that your child will develop throughout Curriculum for Excellence.

### \*REFLECTIONS ON THE CFE NATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS 2013/14

S4 parents from several high schools recently attended our focus group which asked 'How has S4 been for you and your child?' Our findings will feed into the work of the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence Management Board. There were some common themes. Young people and teachers had worked really hard; parents recognised and were very grateful for this. Testing as a way of completing Unit Assessments had been extensive but schools are telling parents that this will reduce for the new S4 cohort, as teachers refine and compound their assessing techniques, with input from the Scottish Qualifications Authority. ### for 2014/15

We took the unusual step (for us) of asking for an additional in-service day for primary schools in 20914/15 which has now been agreed by the Scottish Government. We would like schools to use some of the day to look at tracking children's progress and at how this is reported to parents. Please do ask at your school about this. The report by our working group on attainment will be a useful tool for schools (see left).

The Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014 The Children and Young People (Scotland)

Act was passed on 19 February. There are several strands within the Act. From August, all children aged 3 and 4 will be entitled to 600 free hours of early years learning and childcare (up from the current entitlement of 475 hours per year). Children from the age of two who are looked after, who are subject to kinship care orders or who live in workless households will also be entitled to this 600 hours. Public consultation on guidance for the Named Person and Child's Plan aspect of the Act will begin in 2015. Outline guidance is available <a href="here.">here.</a>. This relates to the Getting it Right for Every Child (GIRFEC) approach which is already being implemented across Scotland; more engagement events are planned for this. The children's rights and children's services part of the Act places new duties on health boards and local authorities: a working group is being set up to look at how these duties will be recorded and reported. Provisions in the Act to provide further support to children and young people in care and to care-leavers will require guidance and secondary legislation. Further information on other aspects of the Act - school closures, children's hearings and the provision of school meals - is to follow.
