## **SPEAKER** BIOGRAPHIES



## Bruce Robertson

Bruce Robertson was Director of Education, Culture and Sport in Highland Council from 1998-2007 and Director of Education Learning and Leisure in Aberdeenshire from 2007-2010. Prior to entering Local Authority leadership roles, he spent 17 years working in various schools in North East Scotland. Between 2010 – 2016, Bruce worked in an advisory capacity with The Scottish Government, the Association of Directors of Education in Scotland (ADES), and other national agencies. He recently spent a period as interim Chief Executive at Bord na Gaidhlig.

Bruce has extensive experience in education and children's services and has been closely associated with many of the key national policy developments for a number of years now. He recently chaired the national group which prepared the Statutory Guidance on Gaelic Education which, from February 2017, gave new responsibilities to NPFS.

He is former chairman of the Scottish Advisory Committee for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award and chairs a small charity, GAMSCOT, which supports education and skills development in The Gambia. He is a Trustee and Board member of Keep Scotland Beautiful, and has recently been appointed as an independent member of the University of the Highlands and Islands F.E. Regional Board.

Bruce is a past President of ADES, a Fellow of the SQA, and was awarded an OBE in 2006 for services to Education.



## **John Swinney MSP** Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills

John joined the SNP in 1979 at the age of 15 and has held a number of posts within the Party at local and national level. He has been the National Secretary, Vice Convener for Publicity and Deputy Leader before leading the party from 2000-2004.

John was elected as the Member of Parliament for North Tayside on 1st May 1997 in a seat that had once been the safest Conservative seat in Scotland.

On 6th May 1999 John was elected as the Member of the Scottish Parliament for North Tayside. In 2011 the boundary changes meant the creation of new constituencies and John Swinney was elected as MSP for Perthshire North. He was re-elected in 2016.

John is a member of the SNP Scottish Government and was the Cabinet Secretary for Finance and Sustainable Growth from 2007-2014. In November 2014 John Swinney was appointed as Deputy First Minister of Scotland and Cabinet Secretary for Finance, Constitution and the Economy. After the Scottish Parliament election on 5th May 2016 John Swinney was re-appointed as the Deputy First Minister and is now the Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills.

## Marinieves Alba

Marinieves Alba is an educator, cultural worker, and writer. She currently holds dual roles for Children's Aid in New York City where she is a veteran Community School Director, and acts as Director of Arts for the agency's national partnerships and local arts initiatives. She co-edited and contributed to groundbreaking social justice anthology Women Warriors of the Afro-Latina Diaspora (Arte Publico Press/University of Texas, 2012), and co-authored a chapter on Children's Aid Society Community Schools Results in the global anthology, Developing Community Schools, Community Learning Centers, Extended-service Schools and Multi-service Schools: International Exemplars for Practice, Policy and Research (Springer International Publishing (Switzerland), 2016).

Marinieves is an advocate for holistic approaches to youth and community development, and incorporates restorative practices, mindfulness, and non-violent communication (NVC) into her work as a organizational leader and coach. She serves as an organizational consultant and coach-trainer through her company, Restoration ProjeX. Marinieves holds degrees from Wesleyan University and New York University-Wagner Graduate School of Public Service, and graduate certificates from Fordham University and the International Institute of Restorative Practices (IIRP).



## **Castleview Primary School**

The Castleview Craigmillar Castle Tour Guides are our P7 pupils who deliver tours to schools across Scotland. They take on the role of the famous Preston family who inhabited the castle during the time of Mary Queen of Scots. The pupils of Castleview are delivering tours, flying the flag for Craigmillar and Scotland.



Born in Edinburgh, Lindsey Watt has been teaching since 1979 and has recently retired from her post as the Headteacher of Castleview Primary School, Craigmillar, Edinburgh. She was previously Headteacher of Edinburgh's Abbeyhill and Sciennes Primary Schools.

She was appointed to the Castleview post in February 2005 after participating in Columba 1400's Headteacher Leadership Academy in December 2003. The HMIe Inspection of 2013 gave Castleview excellent evaluations, which rate the Castleview school experience as one of the best in Scotland.

In 2011, Lindsey was a member of the Cabinet Secretary for Education and Life Long Learning's Attainment Group and in 2013/14 she was seconded to the Department of Children and Families to support the raising of attainment across the city and to create a leadership programme for Headteachers. She returned to Craigmillar in May 2014 to resume her post at Castleview with the additional responsibility of seconded Headteacher Broad General Education at Castlebrae Community High School. Lindsey was recently awarded the 2017 Robert Owen Award by the Deputy First Minister for being an Inspirational Educator and has been invited to join the International Council of Education Advisers.
