 Protect them from cyber-attack (website or telephone systems being hacked)

 Run online services which are safe for people to use



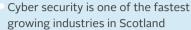
 Find ways to keep defending systems and services against new threats

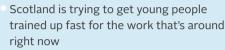


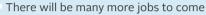
 Help them get back on track quickly after a security breach

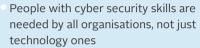


Growing number of jobs

Rewarding

- Working in cyber security is well paid: entry-level salary is around £25,000 a year. The average salary is around £51,200 a year, more than double the Scotland average
- There's the chance to work anywhere in the world: these qualifications and skills are transferable and are in huge demand
- There are jobs with the giants: think Google, Apple, RBS; and on a much smaller scale too

Open to anyone

Your young person doesn't need to be a technical whizz to work in cyber security. People skills are just as vital. Organisations large and small need staff who can pay attention to detail, communicate well, solve problems quickly, and organise themselves and others.

Getting qualified

There are different ways to get qualified. There's a big push to attract young people into this area because not enough have the qualifications for the many jobs around.

Schools are introducing the subject, and there are college and university courses too. Many companies are training their own staff. And the Scottish Government is keen get more people qualified by giving young people options to earn and learn through:

- **Foundation** apprenticeships which combine learning and training with school subjects
- Modern apprenticeships which combine paid work with training
- **Graduate** apprenticeships which combine paid work with a university degree
